

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Arab Musician and Folklorist
"The Sound Of Culture"

This fluid confluence of performance and oratory is a tour into the soul of traditional Arab music. Using multiple instruments, Nagi illuminates his tradition's connection to the intimate aesthetic of Chamber music, the microtonal timelessness of Early music, and the extemporaneous adventurism of jazz. He poetically weaves in educational information to help the audience hear past political caricature, and absorb the genuine Arab culture that is carried by these melodies and rhythms.

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16" ANTONIO PELIZON VIOLA GORIZIA 1814

Italian violin maker Antonio Pelizon (Pellizon)
was born in 1763 in the Gorizia province of Italy
and died there in 1850. An active center of music,
carpentry, and other artisanry since the early 18th
century, Gorizia became well represented for violin
making, due to the significant work of Pelizon and his
four sons: Giuseppe Francesco (1800–1874), Antonio
Vincenzo Giuseppe (Antonio II, 1809–1861), Carlo
(1811–1891), and Filippo (1817–1897).


Pelizon's instruments show the influence of Stradivari and Amati models incorporated with his own personal characteristics. A highly regarded maker of the Northern Italian school, many of Pelizon's and his sons' instruments are housed in the museum of the Gorizia Castle in Gorizia, Italy.

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SIGNATURE ARTISTS

Kim Kashkashian, internationally recognized as a unique voice on the viola, was born of Armenian parents in Michigan. She studied the viola with Karen Tuttle and legendary violist Walter Trampler at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore. Since fall 2000 she has taught viola and chamber music at New England Conservatory. Following Grammy Award nominations for several previous recordings, Kashkashian received a 2012 Grammy Award in the "Best Classical Instrumental Solo" category for Kurtág and Ligeti: Music for Viola, on the ECM Records label. Kashkashian's recording, with Robert Levin, of the Brahms Sonatas won the Edison Prize in 1999. Her June 2000

recording of concertos by Bartók, Eötvös, and Kurtág won the 2001 Cannes Classical Award for a premiere recording by soloist with orchestra. In 2016, Kashkashian was elected a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Kashkashian has worked tirelessly to broaden the range of technique, advocacy, and repertoire for the viola. A staunch proponent of contemporary music, she has developed creative relationships with György Kurtág, Krzysztof Penderecki, Alfred Schnittke, Giya Kancheli, and Arvo Pärt, and commissioned works from Peter Eötvös, Ken Ueno, Thomas Larcher, Lera Auerbach, and Tigran Mansurian. Marlboro and the Viennese school represented by her mentor, Felix Galimir, were major influences in developing her love of chamber music. Kim Kashkashian is a regular participant at the Verbier, Salzburg, Lockenhaus, Marlboro, and Ravinia festivals. She has long-standing duo partnerships with pianist Robert Levin and percussionist Robyn Schulkowsky, and played in a unique string quartet with Gidon Kremer, Daniel Phillips, and Yo-Yo Ma. As a soloist, she has appeared with the great orchestras of Berlin, London, Vienna, Milan, New York, and Cleveland, and in recital at the Metropolitan Museum of New York, Kaufmann Hall, New England Conservatory's Jordan Hall, as well as in Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Frankfurt, Berlin, Paris, Athens, and Tokyo. Kashkashian's musicianship has been well represented on recordings through her association with the prestigious ECM label in a fruitful collaboration that has been continuous since 1985. Kim Kashkashian has taught in Bloomington, Indiana, and in Freiburg and Berlin, Germany, and now resides with her daughter in Boston. Kim is a founding member of Music for Food, an initiative by musicians to fight hunger in their home communities.

Selected as a BBC New Generation Artist in 2019, **Timothy Ridout** is one of the most sought after violists of his generation. With recent awards including the inaugural Sir Jeffrey Tate Prize in Hamburg and a Borletti-Buitoni Trust Fellowship, Timothy Ridout has confirmed his position at the forefront of young European soloists. He has been a BBC New Generation Artist since 2019 and joined the Bowers Program of the Chamber Music Society of the Lincoln Center in 2021. Recent concerto engagements include Berlioz Harold en Italie with the Deutsches Sinfonie-Orchester Berlin, Orchestre National

Bordeaux Aquitaine and Orchestre National de Lille; Mozart Sinfonia Concertante at the Sion Festival (alongside Janine Jansen) and with the Chamber Orchestra of Europe and Camerata Salzburg; Bartok with the BBC Symphony, Hamburger Symphoniker, and Sinfonieorchester Aachen; Walton with the Philharmonia Orchestra and Luzerner Sinfonieorchester; and the Britten Double Concerto with the Tapiola Sinfonietta and Siberian State Symphony Orchestra. He has worked with conductors including Christoph Eschenbach, David Zinman, Gabor Takács-Nagy, Sylvain Cambreling, and Sir Andras Schiff. Equally in demand as a recitalist and chamber musician, his engagements include several appearances per season at the Wigmore Hall as well as throughout the UK, Europe, and Japan. Festivals invitations encompass Lucerne, Lockenhaus, <mark>Heimbach, Bergen, Evian,</mark> Boswil Sommer, Heidelberger-Frühling, Montpellier, Aspen, the Enescu Festival, and the Marlboro Academy; whilst his chamber music collaborators include Joshua Bell, Isabelle Faust, Janine Jansen, Christian Tetzlaff, Nicolas Altstaedt, Steven Isserlis, Kian Soltani, Benjamin Grosvenor, Lars Vogt, and Christian Gerhaher, among many others. He also maintains a regular relationship with the Nash Ensemble. His second album, Music for Viola & Chamber Orchestra: Vaughan Williams, Martinu, Hindemith & Britten with Jamie Phillips and l'Orchestre de Chambre de Lausanne was released to general acclaim in February 2020 on Claves Records. He released his debut album with Champs Hill Records in spring 2017, Henri Vieuxtemps: Complete works for Viola, with pianist Ke Ma. In 2016 Ridout won 1st Prize in the Lionel Tertis Competition and was selected by Young Classical Artists Trust (YCAT). Other prizes include the 2019 Thierry Scherz Award at the Sommets Musicaux de Gstaad and 1st Prize at the 2014 Cecil Aronowitz Competition. Born in London in 1995, Ridout studied at the Royal Academy of Music graduating with the Queen's Commendation for Excellence. He completed his Master's at the Kronberg Academy with Nobuko Imai in 2019 and in 2018 took part in Kronberg Academy's Chamber Music Connects the World. He plays on a viola by Peregrino di Zanetto c.1565-75 on loan from a generous patron of Beare's International Violin Society.

Recipient of the AVS Career Achievement Award

Marcus Thompson has taught at New England Conservatory since 1983. Also a member of the faculty at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology since 1973, in 2015 that school awarded Thompson its highest honor, the title of Institute Professor. Thompson has earned critical acclaim since his New York recital debut in 1968 as winner of the Young Concert Artists International Auditions. He has since performed as soloist with the Boston Pops, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Cleveland Orchestra, the National Symphony, the Atlanta Symphony, the St. Louis Symphony, and the Philadelphia Orchestra. As a recitalist, he has appeared in series throughout the Americas, including New York's Carnegie Recital Hall and Metropolitan Museum, Boston's Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum, Minneapolis's Orchestra Hall, San Francisco's Herbst Theater, Teatro Nacional in the Dominican Republic, Terrace Theater at The Kennedy Center, and the National Gallery in Washington, D.C. An artist member of the Boston Chamber Music Society since 1984, Thompson became BCMS's second artistic director beginning with the 2009/2010 concert season, succeeding cofounder and NEC alumnus, cellist Ronald Thomas '74. In fall 2009 Thompson also launched a blog in which he discusses repertoire performed by BCMS. Thompson has been a frequent quest of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Vermeer, Muir, Emerson, Orion, and Audubon string quartets, and chamber music festivals in Amsterdam, Dubrovnik, Marlboro, Santa Fe, Seattle, Sitka, Spoleto, and Vail. Mr. Thompson earned Bachelor, Master's and Doctorate degrees at the The Juilliard School following viola and viola d'amore studies with Walter Trampler. His repertoire includes Boston Premieres of György Ligeti's Loop, John Harbison's Sonata for Viola and Piano, and Harbison's Viola Concerto, recorded last season with BMOP in celebration of the composer's eightieth birthday. Mr. Thompson has also commissioned and premiered Viola Concerto by Olly Wilson with the Rochester Philharmonic. His recordings include Paul Hindemith's Der Schwanendreher, Ernest Bloch's Suite, Joseph Jongen's Suite, Jean Francaix's Rhapsodie, Shadow/ Light by Elena Ruehr, Viola Concertos by Béla Bartók and Tibor Serly, and Frank Martin's Sonata da Chiesa for Viola d'Amore and Strings.

FEATURED ARTISTS

Jeffrey Irvine joined the faculty of the Cleveland Institute of Music as the Fynette H. Kulas Professor of Viola in September of 1999. He was Professor of Viola at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music from 1983 to 1999 and was also chair of Oberlin's string division from 1992 to 1999. His students have gone on to major orchestral, teaching, and chamber music posts across the country and around the world (for further information, please go to jeffreyirvine.com). His students have often been first-prize winners in major viola competitions, including the Primrose Competition, the ASTA National Solo Competition, and the Washington International Competition. Irvine previously taught at Wichita State University and the Eastman School of Music. He has published numerous articles on viola pedagogy in American String Teacher and the Journal of the American Viola Society, Irvine is well known as a violist and a chamber musician. As a member of the New World String Quartet, Irvine performed throughout the United States and Europe, including concerts at Carnegie Recital Hall and the Kennedy Center. Irvine was the Principal Violist of the Wichita Symphony from 1977 to 1981 and has also been a member of the Aspen Festival Orchestra and Chamber Symphony. Irvine is also active as a teacher and performer at summer festivals. In 2018 he returned to the Aspen Music Festival where he had previously taught from 1981 to 1991 and from 2000 to 2011. He is also on the Artist Faculty of the Interlochen Viola Workshop. From 2012 to 2014 he was on the Artist Faculty of the Perlman Music Program, and from 2015 to 2018 he was on the Artist Faculty of the Bowdoin International Music Festival. He was on the faculty of the ENCORE School for Strings from 1999 until 2007. He has also taught at the Heifetz International Music Festival, the Castleman Quartet Program, the Meadowmount School of Music, the Killington Music Festival, the Park City Chamber Music Festival, and Idyllwild School of Music and the Arts. The first-prize winner in the 1979 Aspen Music Festival Viola Competition and the 1976 Cleveland Quartet Competition (as a member of the Carmel Quartet), Irvine received his Bachelor of Music degree from the Philadelphia Musical Academy and his Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music. His teachers have included Heidi Castleman, Charles Castleman, Dorothy DeLay, Martha Katz, William Primrose, Margaret Randall, Karen Tuttle, and Donald Weilerstein. He is married to violist Lynne Ramsey with whom he has two children, Hannah and Christopher. He plays a viola by Hiroshi lizuka, made in 2017. He is also an avid runner, having run seven marathons and 20 half-marathons.

STARRING



Twenty-four year old American violist **Natalie Loughran** is quickly establishing herself as one of the most versatile young artists of our time. Natalie was awarded First Prize at the 2021 Primrose International Viola Competition, along with the Audience Award, as well as the BIPOC Composer Prize for her arrangement and performance of William Grant Still's, *Mother and Child*. She has also appeared as a finalist for the 2020 Young Concert Artist Auditions, and was awarded a special prize for her performance of the

Bowen Viola Sonata in c minor at the Tertis International Viola Competition. A former member of the Kila Quartet, Natalie is a sensitive and passionate chamber musician. She has appeared on WQXR's series, 'Midday Masterpieces,' and has participated in the Perlman Music Program Chamber Workshop, Robert Mann String Quartet Institute, Yellow Barn, and Kronberg's Chamber Music Connects the World. She will also attend Marlboro Music Festival in Summer 2022. Natalie has collaborated with such renowned chamber musicians as Itzhak Perlman, Donald Weilerstein, Gidon Kremer, and Tabea Zimmerman. In addition to chamber music and solo performance, Natalie holds a deep love of the orchestral repertoire, and has worked as principal violist under the batons of Simon Rattle, Valery Gergiev, Charles Dutoit, and Esa-Pekka Salonen. She has performed with the Verbier Festival Chamber Orchestra under Gábor Takács-Nagy; toured internationally with the Budapest Festival Orchestra directed by Ivan Fischer; and performs regularly with the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and New York Philharmonic. Natalie earned her BM in Viola Performance at The Juilliard School under the tutelage of Roger Tapping. She is a proud recipient of a Kovner Fellowship at the Juilliard School, where she is currently pursuing her MM under Roger Tapping and Misha Amory.

SPECIAL GUESTS

Recipient of the AVS Honorary Membership Award

Dr. Carlos Aleixo dos Reis is Associate Viola Professor at the Federal University of Minas Gerais, Brazil. He completed his Master of Music in Viola Performance at Shenandoah University in 1995. In May 2006, he finished his doctorate program in Musical Arts Performance/Viola (USA) with a scholarship from CAPES/MEC. Carlos has taught at festivals in Brazil, given master classes, and lectures about performance. Dr. Aleixo performs in a duo with piano with Dr. Cenira Schreiber. The Duo has performed in Brazil and foreign countries at International Congresses and other festivals. In June of 2014 the Duo presented a Lecture Recital entitled Exploring New Repertoire for Viola: Brazilian

Music for Viola and Piano at the American Viola Society Festival and Primrose Competition in Los Angeles, CA, USA. In the year of 2016 they presented a Lecture Recital about Contemporary Brazilian Music at the 43rd IVC in Cremona.

Recipient of the AVS Maurice W. Riley Award

David M. Bynog is the author of Notes for Violists: A Guide to the Repertoire, published in 2020 by Oxford University Press. From 2008 to 2014, he served as Editor of the Journal of the American Viola Society, and in 2010 he established the sheet-music publishing branch of the American Viola Society. A librarian by profession, he is an active freelance violist in the Houston area and has taught graduate musicology courses at Rice University and the University of Houston.

Recipient of the AVS Dwight Pounds Service Award

Dr. **David Dalton** is professor emeritus of viola at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah (USA). He earned his B.M. and M.M. degrees in violin at the Eastman School of Music, where his interest in viola was awakened by Francis Tursi. After meeting William Primrose, he switched to viola and received his doctorate in performance at Indiana University. Dr. Dalton collaborated with Primrose in writing his memoir, *Walk on the North Side* and *Playing the Viola: Conversations with William Primrose*, published by Oxford University Press. He also produced two documentaries, "A Violist's Legacy," and "William Primrose,

Violist." Primrose and he were cofounders of the Primrose International Viola Archive (PIVA) at BYU, the largest and most important repository of materials related to the instrument. Dr. Dalton's editions for viola have been published by C.F. Peters, Oxford, G. Schirmer, Eschig, Doblinger, and Rarities for Strings. His numerous articles have appeared in professional journals, such as *The Strad*. Dalton served as president of the American and International Viola Societies, as well as editor of

the Journal of the American Viola Society. Retired, he no longer performs as soloist or chamber musician, but teaches, lectures, researches in PIVA, and pursues family history. In 2013 in Krakow, Poland, the International Viola Society awarded Dr. Dalton the "Golden Viola Clef," the Society's highest honor for his distinguished and unique contributions to the viola. This award had been given only once before in the past 50 years.

2022 AVS Festival & 47th IVC Dedicatee

Manuel Díaz was born in 1933 in Spain during the brewing of the Spanish Republic Civil War. Living in Barcelona at the time, one of the last cities lost to the Republicans, Díaz and his mother escaped, first to France and later to Chile, South America with his father. Eventually settling in Renca, Díaz's family flourished. It was there, while walking with his father in downtown Santiago to look for tools, that they passed a pawnshop where the young Díaz found his first violin. He took lessons with Mr. Zoltan Fisher, principal viola of the Chilean Symphony, at the Chilean Conservatory. Díaz was enticed by the warm and deep sound of his teacher's instrument and eventually switched to viola. He continued with his studies, receiving his Master's in Music and a degree in Mechanical Engineering. As a Fulbright scholar, Díaz was able to come to the United States to study at Indiana University with William Primrose. During his time at IU, he became a member of the American Federation of Musicians, which helped to facilitate his return to America eight years later, in September of 1973, only one day before the military coupe in Chile ended the communist regime and closed the borders. Upon moving to the United States, Díaz joined the Atlanta Symphony and worked at an Engineering firm during the Symphony's off-season. In 1986, he accepted a temporary teaching position at Columbus College and was offered a permanent position one year later as an Associate Professor of Music at Columbus State University. Díaz was awarded the rank of Professor in 2003 and retired in 2008.

Pianist Judith Gordon has explored a diverse repertory in collaboration with an exceptionally wide range of solo artists and ensembles. She was a member of the percussion-based Essential Music, focusing on the American Experimental tradition, and has been soloist with groups including the Boston Pops Orchestra, Boston Modern Orchestra Project, and Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra. An associate professor of music at Smith College from 2006-20, she is a graduate of NEC, where she recently received an Outstanding Alumni Award. Now based in New Mexico, she plays regularly with the musicians of ChatterABQ, Albuquerque Chamber Soloists, and Serenata Santa Fe.

Praised by the New York Times for her "passionate and insightful" playing, Renana Gutman has performed across four continents as an orchestral soloist, recitalist, and collaborative artist. She played at venues like The Louvre Museum, Grenoble Museum, Carnegie Hall Presents, People's Symphony Concerts, Peggy Rockefeller Series, 92nd Street Y, Chautauqua Performing Arts Center, St. Petersburg's Philharmonia, Stresa Music Festival, Mecklenburg-Vorpommern, Ravinia Rising Stars, Jordan Hall, Gardner Museum, Herbst Theatre, Menuhin Hall, UNISA, Marlboro, National Gallery, Phillips Collection, and Freer Gallery. Her performances are heard frequently on WQXR Young Artists Showcase, NY, WFMT Dame Myra Hess, Chicago, and MPR in Performances Today, MN.

Isabel Hagen is a stand-up comedian and classically trained violist. As a comic, she has been featured on The Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon and as a New Face of Comedy at the Just for Laughs festival in Montréal. Isabel started stand-up right after earning her BM and MM degrees in viola performance from the Juilliard School. As a violist, Isabel has played in the orchestra for several productions on Broadway including Les Miserables, Fiddler on the Roof, and Rocktopia. She has toured internationally and worked with numerous artists such as Björk, Max Richter, The National, and Steve Reich. Check out her web series IS A VIOLIST on YouTube.

Paul Hostetter, conductor, is The Ethel Foley Distinguished Chair in Orchestral Conducting for the Schwob School of Music at Columbus State University and the Principal Conductor of the Flageolet Ensemble. He served as an assistant to James Levine at the Metropolitan Opera. His discography includes 53 commercially released recordings and these have received numerous honors including a Grammy Award and Downbeat Critics Award.

Recipient of the AVS Founders Award

Since 1977, **Hiroshi lizuka** has crafted more than 350 violins and violas. His instruments are performed around the world, from Germany to Japan to Costa Rica and South Africa. After graduating from college in 1968, lizuka was uncertain about his path in life, working odd jobs around Tokyo. As a guitarist—though hardly a classical music enthusiast—he developed an interest in the craftsmen making the guitars; however, at 24, he was considered too old for a traditional apprentice program and was rejected

time and again until a tiny, one-man shop offered to take him on. At 26, he fell in love with the sound of the violin and set aside his guitar work for upper string craftsmanship. Iizuka apprenticed under Soroku Murata, the founder of the Tokyo Violin Making School, for two years before moving to Germany and obtaining his license from the Chamber of Handwork. He and his wife moved to the United States in 1977, but his big break didn't come until 1982, when Emanuel Vardi purchased one of his instruments. Today, Iizuka is still crafting instruments in his Philadelphia shop—mostly violas—including his own model of a "viola d'amore" and a "Rubenesque" viola.

Recipient of the AVS Maurice W. Riley Award

Elizabeth Stuen-Walker, Suzuki Viola Teacher Trainer, lives in Bellingham, Washington, where she teaches viola and violin, directs a church choir, teaches at the community college, plays in the Bellingham Symphony, and played in a string quartet for over 30 years. She received her degrees from the Eastman School of Music and Yale University School of Music. Her viola teachers include Donald McInnes, Francis Tursi, Harold Coletta, and Raphael Hillyer. In addition, she attended many summer festivals where she worked with outstanding mentors too numerous to mention. As a child, her musical studies used piano violing and viola. She began her teaching career in 1969, during her high school

She began her teaching career in 1969, during her high school years in Seattle. Following graduate school, she taught at the Preucil School in lowa City where she played in the Tri-Cities Symphony, Cedar Rapids Symphony, and taught at Cornell College. Ms. Stuen-Walker returned to her native Pacific Northwest in 1984. Ms. Stuen-Walker has been an active clinician worldwide, including conducting tour groups comprised of violists from across North America and Scandinavia to Europe, Australia, and Japan. She has twice served on the Board of Directors of the SAA, currently is chair of both the SAA and ISA Viola Committees, and served on the SAA Teacher Development Advisory Committee. Currently she is focused on Suzuki Viola Teacher Training, teaching and accompanying her students for recitals and contests. Her published works include Ensembles for Viola, Violas in Concert, Treble Clef for Violists, two volumes of Christmas carols for viola ensemble, Shostakovich's Gavotte for Viola Quartet, and an ensemble collection, Arias for Four Violas.

Featured Composer

Recently featured in the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra EarShot New Music Readings, Sakari Dixon Vanderveer seeks to incorporate the unique artistry of her collaborators in each of her works. Pieces such as Obsidian, rippled in moonlight, gleams and Fire Season, both written for Salastina, embody her affinity for employing visceral, stark contrasts that convey her recurring fascination with metamorphosis as a natural element of life. Vanderveer's latest premieres include collaborations with Derek Bermel, for

Connecting ACO Community; HOCKET, for #What2020SoundsLike; and Maxine Troglauer, for the Composers Conference, which she attended as a Fromm Foundation Composer Fellow. Others include commissions for the Seattle Metropolitan Chamber Orchestra and the Portland Youth Philharmonic. An alumna of the University of Redlands, Vanderveer's primary teachers include violists Mark Braunstein and Kira Blumberg as well as composers Anthony Suter, Reena Esmail, and Derrick Skye. Described as "thrilling and powerful" (Journal of the American Viola Society), her unaccompanied piece El príncipe sombrío y los recuerdos de su niñez remains a popular choice among violists. Her suite of unaccompanied works, Bagatelles for Strings, was commissioned for the 36th Annual Irving M. Klein International String Competition, where it premiered on The Violin Channel. A member of the New Music USA Program Council and a Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra Composer Teaching Artist Fellow, Vanderveer's desire to empower youth also remains a catalyst behind much of her work. She recently founded the You(th) Can Compose! Summer Workshop, a personalized, online intensive program for students ages 10-18 who are new to composing. Vanderveer's aim is that children from all walks of life will gain access to contemporary music and composition, allowing them to develop a better appreciation and understanding of concert music – new and old – so that they, too, can cherish it and engage with it throughout their entire lives.

PIANISTS

Pianist Susan Hoskins joined the faculty of the Schwob School of Music in 2006. Mrs. Hoskins received degrees in piano performance from Auburn University and The University of Texas at Austin. Subsequently, while a Rotary scholar in Salzburg, Austria, she was asked to join the faculty of the Mozarteum Conservatory of Music as a vocal coach. While in Europe, she collaborated with singers and chamber musicians in recitals and opera competitions throughout Germany, Austria, and France. Having accompanied students to regional and national titles through Music Teachers National Association and National Association of Teachers of Singing, as well as to the Prague Spring International Competition in the Czech Republic, she has also served as a collaborative pianist for the American String Teachers Association competition, the Atlanta Horn Symposium, The Carolyn Hove English Horn Masterclasses, the Southeast Trombone Symposium, the 43rd International Trombone Festival, and the International Double Reed Society Conference 2016.

Russian pianist Ksenia Kurenysheva graduated from the Gnesin Russian Academy of Music in 2012. After graduating she relocated to the United States, completing graduate degrees in Piano Performance at Columbus State University's Schwob School of Music. She is currently a doctoral candidate in Piano Performance at the Hugh Hodgson School of Music. In 2019 Ksenia returned to Columbus State University, and is currently an adjunct faculty member at the Schwob School of Music with teaching duties in piano and collaborative performance.



Tatiana Muzanova started her musical education in Moscow where she earned her degree in piano performance at the Gnesin's State Academy of Music. In 2010 she moved to the US to study at the Schwob School of Music at Columbus State University, where she completed her Artist Diploma Certificate and earned her Master in Piano Performance Degree. And now works as a piano professor and collaborative pianist.



Pianist Rachel Zimmerman, a graduate of the Schwob School of Music, enjoys collaborating with music students, choirs, colleagues, and friends in their pursuit of making the world just a little bit better. Some of her recent highlights include working with the Schwob Opera Theater, touring China with the American Hollywood Orchestra, forming the Tabor Piano Trio, and premiering new works by local composers.



Violin and cello classes at the Paris Conservatoire began as early as 1795. The double bass classes started in 1827. However, it was not until 1894, nearly one hundred years later, that the thirty-one year-old Théophile Laforge was asked to start teaching a viola class! As required by the Conservatoire to this day, each instrumentalist had to include the same prescribed contemporary piece, called Pièce de Concours, in their performance for the final examination known as the Concours or Le Prix. This was a piece full of virtuosic technical challenges and lyrical qualities, designed to demonstrate students' newly acquired skills. From 1896 to 1940 twenty-seven new compositions for viola were commissioned for this purpose (many of them dedicated to Théophile Laforge). Similar in aesthetic and general outline to the famous Clarke sonata, I believe that Fox's viola sonata should have a place in the viola repertoire, particularly in a pedagogical context. In this paper I will share a description of the Fox sonata, enhanced by video clips from a recent performance, and explain its relevance to violists today. Additionally, I will give a brief account of Fox's tragically short life, compiled from research I conducted at the British Library and the archive of the Society for Women Musicians.

The Mangaung String Program is a string music development program initiated by the Free State Musicon in July 1997 under the directorship of Peter Guy, that targets children from historically disadvantaged backgrounds from various districts within the Free State.

Lessons take place at the Free State Musicon in the afternoons, and are provided by staff members of the Department of Sport, Arts Culture and Recreation, staff from the Odeion String Quartet, as well as partnering institutions and music students and interns from within the program. Each pupil pays a modest fee of R1200 (~74USD) a year. This covers tuition, instruments, repairs, teaching materials, and transport. The program operates a bus service, which runs 5 days a week. There are 3 orchestras, based on ability, that all use the name Bochabela and practice on Friday afternoons. Bochabela in Tswana means the place where the sun rises. The program currently has over 500 pupils enrolled from 62 different schools. Half of these pupils are from communities of Thabong, Vredefort, and Parys, outside of Bloemfontein.

The solo viola part in this edition is based on British violist Frederick Riddle's reinterpretation of Walton's original, with many small but noticeable changes of expression and articulation. OUP did this on the basis that Walton was said to have admired Riddle's performances of the work. I will explain the complicated publication history of the piece and show how Riddle's reinterpretation of Walton's original ended up becoming the "Urtext."

A particular expression can be found in four solo pieces by composers from Armenia, the Czech Republic, Serbia, and Poland; all countries in Central and Eastern Europe. An expansive, dark recitative that undulates rhythmically, dynamically, and expressively is present in Dejan Despic's Monolog. Gipsy's Song by Sylvie Bodorová is another example, not to mention the mystic nostalgia present in Mansurian's work. Lastly, Wojciech Widłak's Beyond the Autumn contains fluctuating tempos, repetitions, changing moods, a fragmenting musical tissue, and a poem with reconciliation and silence in the epilogue, depicting nature falling into the sleep of winter.

He holds degrees from Oberlin, Yale, and UC-Santa Barbara.



Nehir Akansu is a versatile violist who plays classical, jazz, folk, and experimental styles. Currently she lives in Valencia, where she is a PhD student in Art: Production and Research at the Faculty of Fine Arts of the Polytechnic University. Her projects and research focus on improvisation in folk & jazz music in interrelation with audiovisuals and contemporary dance. Currently Mr. Alfaro works in his own shop, Alfaro Violins, LLC, in Decatur, Georgia, restoring fine old instruments and creating new violins, violas, and cellos.

This past school year, Ruben served as a lecturer at Texas State University and Assistant Director/Coordinator of the University of Texas String Project. Colombian violist Angie Bolívar-Alfonso is a remarkable example of a rising performer involved in the versatility of chamber music and the creativity of twenty-first-century music repertoire. A dedicated teacher, she was the inaugural faculty violist at Tianjin Juilliard School and TJS Ensemble.



Since 2002, **Nancy Buck** has been on the faculty at Arizona State University, teaching applied viola and chamber music. Her performance experience includes regular appearances with the Phoenix Symphony and the Phoenix Bach Society, including solo opportunities with the West Valley (AZ) and Scottsdale Symphonies. Joseph Curtin is a violin-maker, researcher, and 2005 MacArthur Fellow. He has worked as a maker in Toronto, Paris, and Cremona. In 1985, he and Gregg Alf established the firm of Curtin & Alf, and twelve years later, Curtin opened his own studios. He has built violins for some of the most distinguished artists of our time. In 2013 the "ex-Ricci" Curtin & Alf violin sold in auction for \$132,000, a world record price for work by living makers. He codirects the VSA-Oberlin Acoustics Workshop and is a frequent contributor to *The Strad* and *Strings* magazines.



Dr. **Charlotte Daniel** is Assistant Professor of Flute at Baylor University. With the Austinbased wind quintet, Quin-Texas, she claimed the silver medal in the Fischoff National Chamber Music competition, the Coleman-Saunderson prize at the Coleman Chamber Ensemble Competition, and Third Prize in the American Prize Competition in Chamber Music. Dr. Daniel has served as invited educator, performer, and adjudicator across the country.



Violist **Leanne Darling** is a performer, improvisor, composer, and teacher based in Buffalo, NY. She is comfortable in the concert hall, the nightclub, and the art space. Leanne holds degrees from Eastman and CIM, and has held principal and assistant principal positions in the Florida West Coast Symphony, the Missouri Chamber Orchestra, and the Salzberger Kammerphilharmonie. Specializing in Classical Arabic music as well as Jazz and European Classical music, she combines styles to create repertoire for solo viola and loops generating layers of sound that simulates a whole room full of musicians.



Since 2007, **Andrea Dawson** has taught violin and viola at Middle Tennessee State University School of Music, and violin and chamber music at Tennessee Governor's School for the Arts. A member of the Stones River Chamber Players at MTSU, she has also performed as baroque violinist, violin soloist, and chamber musician in the United States, Mexico, China, Brazil, France, and Curaçao, as well as on national public radio. At Oberlin, she earned degrees in violin performance and anthropology, and a minor in French. After an interim year working for Oberlin's Archaeology lab, she went on to complete her MM and DMA in violin performance and a Performer's Certificate from Eastman School of Music.



Elise Desjardins has been very active for thirty years as a collaborative pianist. On faculty at Conservatoire de Musique de Montreal, she serves as an instrumental coach, pianist, and teacher of collaborative piano. Every summer since 1998, she has been on faculty of the International Domaine Forget Music Festival and Academy. She recorded duo repertoire with Jutta Puchhammer on their CDs, Alto Romantic Fantasies, German Romantic Works, and Pieces de Concours.



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Anthony Devroye enjoys a varied and active career as chamber, orchestral and solo violist, and teacher. As violist of the Avalon String Quartet, he has performed throughout the United States and abroad, including the complete quartet cycles of Beethoven and Bartok and numerous world premieres. The quartet has recorded on the Albany, Cedille, Bridge, and Naxos labels. Mr. Devroye is Professor of Viola at Northern Illinois University. Following undergraduate study at Columbia University (BA) and the Juilliard School, Mr. Devroye received a Diploma from the Curtis Institute.



Erick Iván Díaz graduated from the Violin Making School of Mexico. In 2021 he took first place in the SVA competition for violin workmanship. In 2022 he won the SVA Maker's Choice Award, first place, for violin workmanship and tone, and in 2022 won the SVA Maker's Choice Award, second place, for viola tone.



Karin Dolman is a professor of viola at Codarts, University of Arts Rotterdam in the Netherlands. This is the institute where she was a student herself and graduated both on violin and viola. After her studies, she played for 27 years in the Doelen String Quartet, specializing in performing contemporary classical music.

In 2012 Karin was one of the founding members of the Dutch Viola Society and has been a proud member of the board of the International Viola Society since 2020.



Thomas Dunn is a luthier and physicist who owns and operates Sixth Generation Violin in Saratoga Springs, NY. He studied with and carries on the craft of the Frirsz family, and received a physics degree at Siena College, where he achieved groundbreaking research on the effects of the tailpiece. He makes and repairs instruments for discerning musicians, including his specialty- the Frirsz asymmetric viola.



Duo Prism (Loïc Abdelfettah & Quentin Rebuffet) is an original ensemble composed of a viola and a cello. Founded in 2016 at the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique et de Danse de Lyon (France), Duo Prism is recognized as one of the most promising young French ensembles and is prizewinner of several international competitions including the International Youth Music Competition, Odin International Music Competition, King's Peak International Music Competition, Rudolf Barshai International String Competition, American Music Talent Competition, and International Moscow Music Competition.



Hollie Dzierzanowski is a classically trained violist currently pursuing her DMA in viola performance under the instruction of Susan Dubois with a related concentration in Performing Arts Health at the University of North Texas. Hollie also works as Adjunct Faculty at Dallas College and performs as a section violist with the Amarillo Symphony and Abilene Philharmonic. Hollie received her BA and MM in viola performance from the Cleveland Institute of Music. She is a certified ELDOA trainer and a licensed Body Mapping Educator.



Violist Christina Ebersohl is widely recognized for performances that combine fearless imagination and warm maturity. Christina has been the recipient of numerous scholarships and acknowledgements. She holds a MM in Performance and is a certified ABME instructor. Currently, she is pursuing her Performance Certificate with Basil Vendryes at the Lamont School of Music in Denver, Colorado.



Allyson Fleck, Midsummer's Music (Door County, Wisconsin) Executive Director, Assistant Artistic Director, and violist, has appeared as a soloist, orchestral musician, and chamber musician in the US and abroad. Fleck's previous arts administration roles include positions as orchestral manager and librarian. As an educator, Allyson has taught at Ripon College (WI), Beloit College (WI), and at Kennesaw State University (GA) where she directed the chamber music program and taught studio viola. Fleck received her DMA in Viola Performance from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Fernando Fresno Zarza was born in 1996 in Alcalá de Henares, Spain. He has taken classes with professors of the stature of María José Fueyo, Paul Cortese, and Diederick Suys, among others. He is currently studying towards a Master in Classical Interpretation at Codarts Rotterdam under the guidance of Karin Dolmann. He is researching music composed for viola in Spain during the 20th century. He has been part of orchestras such as the OCA and the JONC, and of chamber groups such as the Attenya Quartet. He has also collaborated outside of the classical idiom, making studio recordings with Violeta Curry, Barreiro Project, and Alejandro Esperanza & Marino Garcimartín Orchestra.

Eva Ferguson, piano, has been Coordinator of the Accompaniment Department in the Illinois Wesleyan University School of Music since 1996. She has participated in international competitions as an accompanist, frequently winning the award for best accompanist, and maintained a busy concert schedule with leading performers throughout Europe.

Swiss bow maker **Pierre-Yves Fuchs** is one of the most celebrated bow makers working today. He studied with Stéphane Thomachot, Gilles Duhaut, Pierre Guillaume, and Benoit Rolland before establishing his own workshop in 1997. His bows are in high demand among professional players worldwide, and they have won numerous awards at international competitions. In the Violin Society of America competition of 2004, Fuchs received the unprecedented honor of winning four Gold Medals: one for each of his violin, viola, cello, and bass bows, earning him the title of Hors Concours.

Dr. **Misha Galaganov**, Professor of Viola at Texas Christian University, is a well-known performer and educator. He has uncovered and performed many unknown and forgotten works for viola and premiered music written for him by many important composers, including Eric Ewazen, Elena Sokolovski, Richard Lavenda, and others. In addition to his teaching, performing, and coordinating duties, Galaganov is a researcher, arranger, and presenter, and he is engaged in summarizing his pedagogical ideas in articles, videos, and books. Many of his former students have successful solo, teaching, and orchestra careers in the USA, Asia, Europe, and Latin America.

Irish violist **Aiveen Gallagher** is a three-time international prize-winner in chamber music and has been the recipient of international bursaries and awards from legendary artists including violinist Ivry Gitlis and violist Bruno Giuranna. After apprenticing for five years under Kenneth Beckmann of Kansas City, he decided to concentrate on making his own instruments. His work has always been informed and inspired by the finest examples available of antique Italian instruments, and through the historical methods and materials used to create them. He chooses to use only tools and techniques that were available in those days.



Myriam Reynolds is a Registered Art Therapist and a Licensed Professional Counselor. She earned her Master of Arts in Counseling Psychology and Art Therapy from Naropa University in Boulder, Colorado and a Bachelor of Fine Art in photography from the University of North Texas. She received her musical training at the Peabody institute of John Hopkins University, and The Juilliard School.



Dr. Erik Rohde maintains a diverse career as a conductor, violinist, and educator, and has performed in recitals and festivals across the United States, Europe, and Asia. He is the newly appointed Director of Orchestral Activities at the University of Northern Iowa, the Music Director of the Winona Symphony Orchestra (MN), and the founding artistic director of the Salomon Chamber Orchestra. Pamela Ryan is Professor of Viola at Florida State University College of Music, where she received two teaching awards. She has performed as soloist at the Aspen Music Festival and with the Thailand Philharmonic, and has recorded for Col Legno, CBC, and Naxos labels. In Tallahassee, Pamela performs with critically praised band, JazzEtcetera, with Richard Bertram, Michael Blizzard, and Stan Rosenthal. She has given a national collegiate viola masterclass and many presentations at national ASTA conferences. For the AVS, she has performed as soloist, served on the national board, and written articles for JAVS.

Elisabeth Smalt (viola) is a chamber musician playing music of all eras. She is also artistic director of the Scordatura Ensemble, which focuses mainly on music with unusual tuning systems, initially inspired by Harry Partch. In 2001 Elisabeth commissioned an exact copy of Partch's Adapted Viola, and she is one of the few musicians to play Partch's music in this authentic way.

Alfrun Schmid is currently based in Amsterdam. Her main focus lies on contemporary and early repertoire, especially when alternative tuning systems are involved. Together with Elisabeth Smalt she is artistic director of Scordatura Ensemble. As a soloist she performs with various ensembles in the Netherlands. Early years were self-taught, while formal training was gained with an apprenticeship at Hans Weisshaar, Inc. in Los Angeles, and years of participation at the Oberlin Violin Making and Acoustic Workshops. Bill Scott is a member of the American Federation of Violin and Bow Makers, a board member of the Oberlin Violin Making Foundation, and current

president of The Violin Society of America.



Dr. Marilyn Seelman received her DMA in Conducting from the University of Miami-Coral Gables, Florida and her MM in Viola from Boston University. She has served as Director of Orchestras and Violist at Trinity University in San Antonio, The University of New Mexico-Albuquerque, and Georgia State University. Her private viola studio has produced prize-winning students, including 2005 Primrose Competition winner Jennifer Stumm.



Molly Sharp is the Principal Violist of the Richmond Symphony, teaches viola at Virginia Commonwealth University, and played in the Oberon String Quartet for 22 years. Molly is also the creator of VlaTutti.com, which provides resources for violists that elevate teaching, learning, and performing through the joy of collaboration.



Dr. Braunwin Sheldrick is professor of viola at EAFIT University in Medellín, Colombia. 

When making an instrument, Jacek strives for both good workmanship and aesthetic balance. Jacek values a balanced look in an instrument as it shows finesse and demonstrates the skillfulness of the maker.



Having grown up in a musical family in Düsseldorf, Germany, **Ute Zahn** trained at and graduated from the Newark School of Violin Making in the UK. She has worked independently as well as in a number of violin shops, and has taught violin making at the Violin Repair Program in Red Wing, MN. She was president of the US chapter of Luthiers sans Frontières and has organized meetings of Minnesota luthiers since 2013. She serves on the advisory board of the Violin Repair Program in Red Wing, is a member of the American Federation of Violin and Bow Makers, the VSA, and the AVS, and regularly attends the Violin Makers Workshop in Oberlin, OH.



Ray Zhang is a junior at Brandeis High School in San Antonio, Texas. Ray has played in ensembles such as NYO2 in 2021 as well as the TMEA All-State Symphony, where he was principal player in 2022. He was recently invited to play in the National Youth Orchestra of the USA for the summer of 2022. Additionally, Ray has been named one of 15 new Texas Commission on the Arts Young Masters.
