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

2024 Primrose International Viola Competition & American Viola Society Festival Dedicated to Dr. David Dalton



In Loving Memory of Dr. David Dalton 1984-2022

David Johnson Dalton (January 18, 1934 - December 23, 2022) was an American violist, author, and professor emeritus at Brigham Young University (BYU). He graduated from Eastman School of Music in 1961 and received his doctorate in viola performance in 1970 at Indiana University School of Music under William Primrose. As a faculty member at BYU, Dalton's main contribution was the establishment of the Primrose International Viola Archive, one of the largest viola archives in the world. Dalton's other significant positions include editor of the Journal of the American Viola Society, president of the American Viola Society, and president of the International Viola Society.

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2024 American Viola Society Festival Featured Composers



Nokuthula Ngwenyama— "Mother of Peace" and "Lion" in Zulu, Nokuthula Ngwenyama has garnered recognition as an orchestral soloist, recitalist, chamber musician, and composer. Also known as "Thula," her performances provide "solidly shaped music of bold mesmerizing character" (*Gramophone*). Her music has been performed by the Detroit Symphony, London Symphony, Chicago Symphony, Phoenix Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic, New Jersey Symphony, Scottish Chamber Orchestra, San Francisco Symphony, Toronto Symphony, KwaZulu Natal Philharmonic, and the Orquesta Nacional de Madrid, among others. Her chamber works have been performed in North America, Africa, and Asia.

Ms. Ngwenyama gained international prominence winning the Primrose International Viola Competition at age 16. The following year, she won the Young Concert Artists International Auditions, which led to debuts at the Kennedy Center and the 92nd Street Y. As a recipient of the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant, she has performed as a soloist and in recitals around the world.

In the 2023-24 season, the renowned Takács Quartet premiered Ms. Ngwenyama's quartet, "Flow." Led by Cal Performances (Berkeley, California) and co-commissioned by the University Musical Society (Ann Arbor, Michigan), Shriver Hall Concerts (Baltimore, Maryland), 92nd Street Y (New York), Philadelphia Chamber Music Society, Friends of Chamber Music (Portland, Oregon), BroadStage (Santa Monica, California), and Capital Region Classical (Schenectady, New York), it celebrates the flow of natural history from our universe's initial creative event to now.

As curator of Composer's Choice, a co-production of Phoenix Chamber Music Society, ASU Kerr Cultural Center (Scottsdale, Arizona), and Peace Mama Productions, Ms. Ngwenyama presents "Cars Talk" for violin, viola, cello, and double bass with Ruggero Allifranchini, Thomas Landschoot, and Nicholas Villalobos, and her concerto for viola and orchestra with piano reduction performed with pianist Eckart Sellheim.

Ms. Ngwenyama collaborates with instrumentalist-composers Valerie Coleman (flute) and Han Lash (harp) in their trio Umama Womama. She also joins Jaime Laredo, Bella Hristova, Milena Pajaro-van de Stadt, Sharon Robinson, and Keith "Robby" Robinson with her work "Sexagesimal Celebration," opening Schoenberg and Dvořák sextets on the Linton Chamber Series (Cincinnati, Ohio).

Born in Los Angeles of Zimbabwean-Japanese parentage, Ms. Ngwenyama attended the Crossroads School for Arts and Sciences and the Colburn School of Performing Arts before graduating from the Curtis Institute of Music. As a Fulbright Scholar, she studied at the Conservatoire National Superieur de Musique et de Danse de Paris and received a Master of Theological Studies from Harvard Divinity School. A voting member of the Recording Academy, Ms. Ngwenyama is the first composer in residence with the Phoenix Chamber Music Society. She resides with her family in Arizona on Tohono Oʻodham land.

2024 American Viola Society Festival Featured Composers



Melia Watras—Hailed by Gramophone as "an artist of commanding and poetic personality" and by The Strad as "staggeringly virtuosic," Melia has sustained a distinguished career as a creator and facilitator of new music and art. The 2023-24 season includes the release of her new album Play/Write, which features her own compositions and works by Anne Leilehua Lanzilotti and Frances White; the world premiere of Watras's Fantasies in alto clef for viola ensemble, commissioned by the American Viola Society for their 2024 festival in Los Angeles; and the debut of Watras's Sarabanda for solo viola, which will be premiered and recorded as part of Atar Arad's project, Partita Party.

Watras's discography has received considerable attention from the press and the public. Her album String Masks, a collection of her own compositions including the titular work which utilizes Harry Partch instruments, was praised for "not only the virtuoso's sensitive playing, but also her innovative and daring spirit," by the Journal of the American Viola Society. Her compositional debut album, Firefly Songs, was hailed for "distilling rich life experiences into strikingly original musical form" by Textura. Schumann Resonances was described by the American Record Guide as "a rare balance of emotional strength and technical delicacy." The Strad called 26 "a beautiful celebration of 21st century viola music." Ispirare made numerous Best of 2015 lists, including the Chicago Reader's ("Watras knocked the wind out of me with the dramatically dark beauty of this recording"). Short Stories was a Seattle Times Critics' Pick, with the newspaper marveling at her "velocity that seems beyond the reach of human fingers." Of her debut solo CD (Viola Solo), Strings praised her "stunning virtuosic talent" and called her second release (Prestidigitation) "astounding and both challenging and addictive to listen to."

Watras's compositions have been performed in New York City, Chicago, Seattle, Bloomington (IN), Columbus (GA), Denmark, Spain, Switzerland and Wales. She has been commissioned by the Avalon String Quartet, violinists Mark Fewer, Rachel Lee Priday and Michael Jinsoo Lim, cellist Sæunn Thorsteinsdóttir, pianist Cristina Valdés, accordionist Jeanne Velonis, violist Rose Wollman, and has had works performed by artists such as violist Atar Arad, singer Galia Arad, pianist Winston Choi, Harry Partch Instrumentarium Director Charles Corey, violinists Tekla Cunningham, Manuel Guillén and Yura Lee, vocalist Carrie Henneman Shaw, percussionist Bonnie Whiting and the ensemble Frequency. Her music has been heard on National Public Radio's Performance Today, and can be found on the albums Play/Write; String Masks; 3 Songs for Bellows, Buttons and Keys; Firefly Songs; Schumann Resonances and 26. Watras's adaptation of John Corigliano's Fancy on a Bach Air for viola is published by G. Schirmer, Inc. and can be heard on her Viola Solo album.

Watras is currently Professor of Viola and Chair of Strings at the University of Washington, where she holds the Ruth Sutton Waters Endowed Professorship and was awarded the Adelaide D. Currie Cole Endowed Professorship, the Donald E. Petersen Endowed Fellowship, the Kreielsheimer and Jones Grant for Research Excellence in the Arts, and the Royalty Research Fund. She plays a viola made by Samuel Zygmuntowicz.




Michael Kimber— (b. 1945) A prolific performer, Michael has toured throughout the U.S., Canada, Mexico, Australia, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, England, Spain, and Italy. He has been featured as a viola soloist on Australian Broadcasting Commission radio and on National Public Radio's "Performance Today." His experience includes concert tours as violist of the Kronos Quartet, fifteen years as violist of the Atlanta Virtuosi, twelve seasons as principal violist of the Kansas City Chamber Orchestra, fifteen seasons with Kansas City's Summerfest chamber series, over thirty solo appearances with orchestras, scores of solo recitals, and hundreds of chamber music performances.


His compositions, mostly for viola, have been widely acclaimed and performed both in the U.S. and abroad. Eminent Polish violist Marcin Murawski has recorded eight CDs of Kimber's music for viola(s). In 2002 Kimber received the music composition award of the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters. In 2010 he was a recipient of the American Viola Society's Founders Award in recognition of his compositions for viola. In 2021 his string orchestra composition Perseverance received honorable mention in the 75th Anniversary Composition Competition of the American String Teachers Association. In 2023 he was the recipient of the prestigious Silver Alto Clef award of the International Viola Society in recognition of his contributions to the viola worldwide. From 2019 to 2023 he served as composer-in-residence for Red Cedar Chamber Music; videos of their performances of his music that they have commissioned can be viewed on their YouTube channel. Kimber's music has also been featured in festivals of the lowa Composers Forum and has been twice selected for performance on Fifteen Minutes of Fame, a production of Vox Novus.

In 1990 Kimber designed the poly-pad shoulder rest, tens of thousands of which have been purchased by violinists and violists in all 50 states, D.C., and 21 foreign countries. This simple, ergonomically designed poly-foam pad has been praised again and again for promoting correct, relaxed playing posture as well as relieving chronic discomfort sometimes experienced by violinists and violists.

After twenty-five years as a viola professor, first at The University of Kansas and then at The University of Southern Mississippi, Dr. Kimber has resided since 2004 in Iowa City, where his wife, Dr. Marian Wilson Kimber, is professor of musicology at The University of Iowa. Recipient of the Iowa String Teachers Association Studio Teacher Award for 2011-12, he taught viola at Coe College from 2005 until his retirement in 2020. He has also been visiting professor of viola at the University of Iowa (spring semesters of 2007 and 2016) and at the University of Northern Iowa (spring semester 2011). Previously active as a solo and chamber music performer, he was a member of the viola section of Orchestra Iowa from 2004 until his retirement in 2024. His years of service to the orchestra were recognized publicly at his last concert.


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

Occupational Health Problems of Violists, an Epidemiological Study

Hollie Dzierzanowski - Violists represent an occupational group with specific biopsychosocial demands, including the physical characteristics of the viola, viola-specific repertoire and performance techniques, and the unique occupational role violists play in the social context of classical music. In addition to the lack of viola-specific data due to researchers grouping string players together, novel web-based survey methodologies based on biopsychosocial frameworks offer increased specificity and precision regarding the lived experiences and consequences of performance-related musculoskeletal pain at specific body sites, non-musculoskeletal problems, and psychosocial challenges including being on the receiving end of viola jokes. For example, while only one known article documents the viola joke cycle, no known studies have reported on the influence of these jokes on violists. The purpose of this study was to apply these new research methodologies to better understand the occupational health problems of violists. Representing the first known epidemiological study exclusively for violists, this study deployed new survey protocols that allowed for detailed assessment of playing-related musculoskeletal problems of violists.

2024 American Viola Society Festival Featured Artist Jessica Meyer



With playing that is "fierce and lyrical" and works that are "other-worldly" (The Strad) and "evocative" (New York Times), Jessica Meyer is an award-winning composer and violist whose passionate musicianship radiates accessibility and emotional clarity. Meyer's first composer/performer portrait album, Ring Out (Bright Shiny Things, 2019) debuted at #1 on the Billboard Traditional Classical Chart. Her second album I long and seek after, a collection of her vocal works which feature strings, was recently released in March of 2024 on New Focus Recordings and was hailed by Musical America as "gorgeously scored."

Since the start of her composition career in 2014 at age 40, Meyer's compositions have viscerally explored the wide palette of colors available to each instrument while combining techniques inspired by her experiences as a contemporary and period instrumentalist. Her works have been performed in venues from the Kennedy Center to Carnegie Hall, by musicians of the Minnesota Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic, and by orchestras around the country. Her first Symphonic Band piece was commissioned and toured by "The President's Own" United States Marine Band and was a finalist for the William D. Revelli Composition Contest. She has also received multiple commissioning awards from both Chamber Music America and the New York State Council on the Arts.

Premieres have included performances by GRAMMY-winning vocal ensembles Roomful of Teeth and Vox Clamantis, the St. Lawrence String Quartet as the composer in residence at Spoleto Festival USA, the American Brass Quintet, PUBLIQuartet, Sybarite 5, NOVUS NY of Trinity Wall Street, a work for A Far Cry commissioned by the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum in Boston, the Juilliard School for a project with the Historical Performance Program, and by the Lorelei Ensemble for a song cycle that received the Dale Warland Singers Commission Award from Chorus America. Recent premieres included works for the Dorian Wind Quintet, Hausmann Quartet, Hub New Music, the Portland Youth Philharmonic in collaboration with the female vocal ensemble In Mulieribus, and her viola concerto GAEA that she premiered alongside the Orchestra of the League of Composers at Miller Theatre in NYC. Upcoming premieres include a new companion piece to the Brahms songs for the Brooklyn Art Song Society, a work for trombone and organ for the American Guild of Organists in honor of their National 2024 Conference, a work for viola and piano commissioned by the Pre-College Department of The Juilliard School, and a new orchestral piece to be premiered by a consortium of orchestras across the United States.

At home with many different styles of music, Jessica can regularly be seen as a soloist, premiering her chamber works, performing on Baroque viola, improvising with jazz musicians, or collaborating with other composer-performers. Ms. Meyer is equally known for her inspirational work as an educator, where she empowers musicians with networking, communication, teaching, and entrepreneurial skills so they can be the best advocates for their own careers. She is also passionate about getting musicians of all ages off the page to activate their own creativity, improvise, and awaken their own inner composer - which in turn makes them better performers. In 2023, she joined both the Viola and Chamber Music Faculty of the Manhattan School of Music.

Of many, 'Fantasia X' is Mudarra's better-known composition. The fantasia uses cross-rhythms and bold chromaticism, resulting in sudden changes of modes and cross-relation. On arranging for the viola, I transposed the piece into a step higher to maximize the use of the open string. Roman's arrangements on Pergolesi's 'Stabat Mater' are unique examples of a solo string. Inspired by his, I arranged the first movement of the same piece for the unaccompanied viola. Although it is called a lute suite, Bach probably wrote BWV 997 for the lautenwerk. Two lute arrangements of Bach's unaccompanied works for strings made me think, "what if this lute suite was an arrangement of a lost work?" My transcription is an answer to this imaginary question. Theme and Variation is one of the most common forms when writing for a solo repertoire due to its ability to show creativity and virtuosity. Imagine me as an 18th-century composer; I composed a theme and Variation based on a traditional Persian Iullaby.

First section, Open C - introduction: unity branching into many dimensions

With its first piece based on a Hawaiian greeting ritual, this section introduces listeners to the defining characteristic of the viola: its C-string, which lends the instrument a low, mellow voice and a sonority that composer György Ligeti described as having "the aftertaste of wood, earth, and tannic acid."

Second section, Pizzicato - searching: cyclical transformations, finding oneself

This section becomes more intimate: listeners must get close to hear the softer sounds of plucked strings as the performer explores, tries on one object after another in a repeating, ritualistic search for the right fit, the right sound and identity.

Third section, Parlando - remembrance: faith, absurdity, hope, joy

This final section adds a layer of sung and spoken voice to the sound of the viola, concluding the program with miniature reflections on human belief and faith, from creation stories to prophets to mourning rites.

French organist Louis Vierne was an active composer and performer in the early twentieth century. Born nearly blind, Vierne showed his musical talent at an early age. He was recommended by César Franck to study organ and later attended the Paris Conservatory. Composed during 1894-95, Deux Pièces pour alto et piano, Op. 5 is Vierne's first chamber music work while he was a student at the Paris Conservatory. "Le soir" is intimate, delicate, and lyrical, while "Légende" is a light movement with Sicilian rhythm. The work received its public performance by the dedicatee Victor Balbreck and composer on the piano in Paris in 1895. Organist and composer Fernande Breilh-Decruck wrote more than 250 pieces, but many of them were not published. Her music was forgotten soon after her death until recent years. Decruck received formal training at the Paris Conservatory. She moved to the United States as an organ recitalist for several years, moved back to France, and later accepted a professorship at the Toulouse Conservatory. Sonata in C-sharp minor was written in 1943, one year after she resigned the teaching position, moved back to Paris, and devoted herself to composition. Decruck created two versions of this work - one with alto saxophone or viola and piano, and the other with orchestra. The composition, dedicated to virtuoso Marcel Mule, has four movements: a sonata-form first movement, a slow lyrical second movement, a scherzo-like "Fileuse" (spinning), and the last movement titled Nocturne et Final. The piece is full of colors, rich harmonies, and flashing sounds.

"My viola sonata is lovingly dedicated to Michael White, an outstanding composer, scholar, and teacher who was one of my dearest friends and an incredibly meaningful mentor, teacher, and role model to me. Michael was an expert on Mozart, whose music he loved passionately, and, like Mozart, he loved the viola all his life. In his later years, Michael wrote a series of chamber works inspired in Jewish music and his Jewish heritage. My viola sonata was commissioned by my friend, Dr. Lola Reid, and was written between 2020 and 2023, with an interruption in between when I worked on other projects. The first movement opens with an introspective soliloquy for the viola that emphasizes its low register, which I find to be incredibly rich and full of expressive possibilities. The movement continues in a fast Allegro con spirito section with its own motive. The second movement, Lento espressivo e rubato, is a reflection on my own Jewish heritage and, in this way, it also pays tribute to Michael White. The last movement, Allegro con brio, is full of rhythmic energy with plenty of syncopated accents, yet another aspect meant to pay homage to my dear dedicatee, Michael White." - Samuel Zyman

On a personal note, Michael White and Samuel Zyman were two of my incredible theory professors while I studied at Juilliard. I would like to share this meaningful piece with the viola community; I can imagine it becoming part of our standard repertoire.

Eric Wubbels' Viola Quartet displays the composer's signature blend of rhythmic vitality, intense physical energy, dense harmonic material, and experimentalism. A virtuosic performer himself, Wubbels expertly exploits the viola quadrupling in athletic unison passages and thorny counterpoint hockets from which melodies sharply emerge and sonorities scintillate. The non-hierarchical structure stretches each violist to the limits of their instrument and a full range of expression, four equal soloists interweaving for a feat of endurance and beauty. This viola quartet makes an argument for the four-viola group as equal to any string quartet in expressivity, virtuosity, and technique and pushes the limits of the viola as a rival to the violin and cello in feats of skill. Underperformed due to its intensity and difficulty, this quartet is unique in its marriage of minimalistic repetition with an attention to timbre and harmony.

20th Century Violist-Composers: Sonata Principles in Solo Works by Fuchs, Porter, and Hindemith

Nicholas Lindell - This lecture-recital surveys three solo viola works by 20th century violist-composers working in America: Lillian Fuchs' 1953 Sonata Pastorale, Paul Hindemith's 1937 Sonate, and Quincy Porter's 1930 Suite for Viola Alone. In particular, all three exhibit manifestations of tonally influenced, post-common-practice sonata forms, which are investigated and compared with original analyses. The implications of the composers' performing careers and the solo viola's unique compositional constraints are discussed as a possible cause for this stylistic congruence.

A prolific composer, poet, and Holocaust survivor, Mira Spektor was born in Berlin in 1928 to Lithuanian parents, fled to France in 1938, and eventually to the United States. In 1975, she founded The Aviva Players to support and perform works of women composers and served as its Artistic Director until her death in 2021. Provincetown Suite is an instrumental suite for flute, viola and piano, adapted from the musical score for the PBS television documentary entitled Art in Its Soul (1987). The title of the suite sets the scene in Provincetown, Massachusetts, a small coastal town on the tip of the Cape Cod peninsula. Sarah Gibson is a Los Angeles based composer and pianist whose works draw on her breadth of experience as a collaborative performer. While writing 10,000 Filaments (2010), Gibson was reminded of Thomas Edison's effort to make the light bulb in which he claimed he had to try 10,000 different filaments before discovering the right one.

"Terzettino" by French composer Théodore Dubois is the first registered work for the flute-viola-harp ensemble, composed in 1905 in romantic style. Its stretched melodies intertwine into a poetic dialog of the instruments. In "Fujin's Dream" (2018), the Volga Tatar born Russian/Canadian composer Airat Ichmouratov refers to Japanese myth about the god of wind. Fujin is the Japanese god of wind, who has been known for bringing devastating typhoons to Japan over the centuries. However, on some days, Fujin decides to be a nice god. Most of the time, Fujin is depicted with his "windbag" which contains the winds, and according to Japanese mythology, Fujin opened the bag at the world's creation and blew away all the clouds so that brightness shone down on the world. In the piece, the composer experiments with timbres, sound effects, and extended technique. "Bacanal" (2005) by Mexican composer Eduardo Angulo is an adaptation of the third movement of his viola concerto for this ensemble. Full of boisterous rhythms and tunes of folk origin it immerses the listeners in a festive atmosphere.

2024 Primrose International Viola Competition About William Primrose



A plaque is affixed to the second story of an apartment house at 18 Wilton Drive, Glasgow. It reads:

One of the greatest musicians of all time, the viola player William Primrose, was born here, 1904.

Guided by his father, an orchestral violinist, and tutored by a student of Ševčík and Joachim, the boy's precocity was not lost on his elders. He suffered under Ševčík exercises, but later admitted they served his left-hand facility well into late life. (The bow arm was a different matter and had to wait to be sculpted into the extraordinary mechanism it became under the influence of the great Ysaÿe.) The boy and young man became exposed to the greatest touring

artists of the day in Scotland and, later, London. Casals and the young Heifetz made profound impressions, but it was Kreisler whose influence was the most indelible. The rhythmic élan and sound became profiles of Primrose's own performances. His early recordings as a violinist attest to his brilliance, witnessing the Rondo capriccioso of Saint-Saëns.

But there had been a dormant yearning since childhood for that curiosity in his father's cupboard, a viola. Not until his Belgian master's encouragement to follow his predilection did the viola became a feature on Primrose's horizon. This, despite familial disappointment and trenchant warning from a friend, "You will make the greatest mistake of your life!" Nevertheless, when the London String Quartet, on tour in America, summoned Primrose to fill in for their indisposed violist, he not only joined, he "burned his bridges," and "walked the road to Damascus, saw the light, repented of past transgressions and switched to the viola." Primrose, the great virtuoso of the solo viola, spent his most satisfying hours of music making in the small ensemble. Perhaps drawing him toward the collaborative art (and the viola) was the "intuitive English penchant for the center of the harmony," as Menuhin expressed it. One can be transported by the recordings of Heifetz-Primrose-Feuermann in Mozart and Dóhnanyi, or Smetana and the Brahms B-flat by the Primrose Quartet, to be both touched and awed by such superb rapport.

Why did Primrose choose to open his recording career as a violist with Paganini caprices? "Youthful pride and ambition," he said to impress others. And in this he did not fail. But the virtuosic show pieces were not the only colors on his artistic palette. The soft supplication of Songs my mother taught me can be moving, and the rhythmic suppleness found in Sarasateana, enchanting. His stylistic affinity captures the attentive adjudicator. Whether it is the melancholy

of Brahms, the sprightliness of Boccherini, or the robustness of Bartók, the sensitive listener is persuaded to agree that stylistically speaking, things are about right. Along the way Primrose felt a certain deficit in his musical upbringing. His experience in the orchestra was limited. Hearing rumors that an orchestra was being assembled especially for Toscanini, he wrote a letter of introduction, went to Milan and presented himself at the maestro's apartment for an audition. Primrose was hired and spent four years on the first desk of the NBC Symphony in New York. At the close of this tenure, he became engaged in another facet of his career, teaching at the Curtis Institute. At this time, when his solo and recording engagements were blossoming, he admitted he wasn't that fascinated by teaching, or prepared to do so. In fact, he admitted he didn't know how his students learned anything from him. However, Joseph de Pasquale and Karen Tuttle would strongly disagree, the two went on to become wonderfully gifted violists and teachers themselves. As Primrose gradually withdrew from the stage, he devoted himself more to teaching at various institutions. In his last years he set down in book form a lengthy exposition on the principles and practice of Playing the Viola. His students, and in turn, their students carry on the Primrose legacy.

Primrose was not a "hot-house" musician, but rather a versatile human being. His respect and use of the English language came about in early stages reading Dickens and Thackeray and other masters of elevated literature. He was an inveterate reader which allowed him to converse with ease on subjects as diverse as the plays of Oscar Wilde or sumo wrestling. His basic manner was often reserved, that of a British gentleman. He expressed himself as "loving this world and all that is good in it and of good report... the glory of music and pictures and poetry and gracious prose."

Is the Primrose ideal in viola performance attainable? Primrose was a rare combination of talents, born and nourished in a different age that has now passed us by. Still, more than ever aspiring violists strive toward that elusive zenith which seems to be touched with a bit of magic or mystery. May the inspiration continue. – David Dalton

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Ayane KozasaJury Chairman
United States

Hailed for her "magnetic, wide-ranging tone" and her "rock solid technique" (Philadelphia Inquirer), violist Ayane Kozasa is a sought-after chamber musician, collaborator, and educator. Since winning the 2011 Primrose International Viola Competition—where she also captured awards for best chamber music and commissioned work performances— Kozasa has appeared on stages across the world, from Carnegie, Wigmore, and Suntory Hall to Ravinia, Aspen, and the Marlboro Music Festival. She is a

passionate advocate for the expansion of viola repertoire, and has commissioned multiple new works featuring the viola, including American Haiku by Paul Wiancko and K'Zohar Harakia by Judd Greenstein.


Kozasa has developed a career that revolves around the art of chamber music. As a founding member of the Aizuri Quartet for 11 years, she developed her skills of launching a brand-new ensemble. The quartet was the 2018 quartet-in-residence at the Metropolitan Museum and the grand prize winners of both the Osaka International String Quartet Competition and MPrize Chamber Arts Competition. The Aizuri Quartet's debut album, Blueprinting-which features the music of 5 American composers, all commissioned by the quartet-was nominated for a Grammy Award and named one of NPR's top 10 classical albums of 2018. With collaboration being a deep part of their identity, they performed with artists such as Wilco, Marcy Rosen, Michi Wiancko, Jonathan Biss, and Maeve Gilchrist. Their devotion to education brought them to young musicians around the world, and they crafted a unique student composer workshop format that they implemented at institutions such as the University of Southern California, Princeton University, and New York Youth Symphony. In 2020, the quartet launched AizuriKids, an interactive web series for children that explores relationships between music and themes ranging from astrophysics to cooking. Their dedication to the art of the string quartet for 11 years was recognized by Chamber Music America, and in 2022 the quartet received the Cleveland Quartet Award.

Currently, Kozasa is a member of the duo Ayane & Paul with composer and cellist Paul Wiancko, with whom she collaborated on Norah Jones' album Pick Me Up Off the Floor. The duo has appeared at several festivals, including Spoleto Festival USA, Brooklyn Chamber Music Society, and the St. Lawrence String Quartet Seminar. Kozasa's most recent passion project Owls is a quartet collective with violinist Alexi Kenney and cellists Gabriel Cabezas and Paul Wiancko. Owls share an uncommonly fierce creative spirit, weaving together new compositions with original arrangements of music ranging from the 1600s to the present, and have played at series such as the Baryshnikov Arts Center in NYC and the Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C.

Other collaboration highlights include performances with world-renowned artists such as Tessa Lark, Steven Banks, Nobuko Imai, and the Kronos Quartet. As a seasoned orchestral performer, Kozasa has performed with the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra, A Far Cry, Philadelphia Orchestra, East Coast Chamber Orchestra, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, as well as the Chamber Orchestra of Philadelphia, where she served as principal violist from 2012 to 2016.

Much of Kozasa's current work involves mentoring aspiring young musicians through programs like the Meadowmount School of Music, Green Lake Chamber Music Camp, and Olympic Music Festival. She is currently on the viola faculty at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music and has been guest faculty at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and Northwestern University. Taking inspiration from her mentors the Cavani Quartet, Kozasa has developed several education-based music shows curated especially for the youth in a festival's community including Caramoor Center for Music and the Arts and Spoleto Festival. Kozasa is a graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music, Kronberg Academy in Germany, and Cleveland Institute of Music, where she studied viola with Misha Amory, Roberto Díaz, Nobuko Imai, and Kirsten Docter.





Atar Arad

United States

Atar Arad was born in Tel Aviv, where he began his early musical education and violin studies. In 1968 he was one of a few young artists to be selected to study in the renowned Chapelle Musicale Reine Elisabeth under the patronage of the Queen of Belgium.

In 1971, drawn by the deep, warm sound of the viola and its broad but unfamiliar repertoire, he decided to devote himself to this instrument and its music. The following year, in July 1972, in his first appearance as a violist, he won the City of London Prize as a laureate of the Carl Flesch

Competition for violin and viola. Two months later he was awarded the First Prize at the International Viola Competition in Geneva by a unanimous decision of the jury.

Numerous concerts followed – as a soloist with major orchestras, and in recitals at some of Europe's most prestigious festivals. Arad's recordings for Telefunken are widely acclaimed. His Sonata per la Grand' Viola e Orchestra by Paganini was considered by stringed-instrument lovers and critics alike to be an astonishing demonstration of the technical capabilities of the viola. His album in collaboration with pianist Evelyne Brancart, was praised by High Fidelity Magazine as being "...perhaps the best-played viola recital ever recorded".

In 1980, Arad moved from London to the U.S. in order to become a member of the Cleveland Quartet for the next seven years. With this great quartet he toured throughout the U.S., South America, Western and Eastern Europe, Israel, and Japan, collaborating with many leading musicians (such as pianists Istomin, Curzon, Pressler and Ax, violists Schidloff and Laredo, Cellists Ma and Rostropovich, flutist Gallway, and clarinetist Stolzmann to name a few), recording for labels such as RCA, CBS, and Telarc, and appearing in music festivals including Aspen, Berlin, Edinburgh, Flanders, Israel, New York Mostly Mozart and Carnegie Hall, Paris, Salzburg, and many more. During that time he held the position of a Professor of Viola at the Eastman School of Music.

Arad was an artist/faculty member at the Aspen School and Festival. He also taught at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University in Houston, TX, and was an artist/lecturer at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh. He currently serves as Professor of Music (viola) at the Jacobs School of Music, Indiana University, Bloomington; and in the summers he also teaches at the Steans Music Institute (Ravinia Festival) in Chicago, Domaine Forget Academy of the Art, Heifetz Institute, and in Keshet Eilon Music Center, Israel.

Arad served as a regular guest artist in a great number of musical venues, such as Houston's Da Camera Society, Seattle Chamber Music Festival, the Upper Galilee Chamber Music Days (Israel), the Norfolk Chamber Music Festival, Chamber Music International in Dallas, Sitka Festival, Chautauqua Festival, Ravinia Music Festival, Orford, Domaine Forget, Banff, and Chicago's North Shore Festival. A frequent guest with today's leading chamber ensembles, Arad has performed, among others, with the Guarneri, Emersson, Tokyo, Mendelssohn, American, Chillingrian, Vermeer, New Zealand, Orion, and more – recently with Pacifica and Verona string quartets.

A late-bloomer composer, Arad wrote his first musical composition – a Solo Sonata for Viola – in 1992. The Sonata was premiered in 1993 as part of Arad's recital at the Viola Congress in Chicago and was published by the Israel Music Institute (1995). His student, violist Roland Glassl, the winner of 1997 Tertis International Competition gave the London premier of the Sonata in 1998 at the Wigmore Hall.

In 1998 Arad completed his first string quartet, premiered in Bloomington on April 1999 by the Corigliano Quartet. His Quartet No.2 (2016) was premiered by the Verona Quartet.



He premiered his own Viola Concerto (2005) in Bloomington, Brussels, and Stockholm with conductors Uriel Segal, Ronald Zollman, and Michael Bartosz, respectively.

Other compositions Include Toccatina A La Turk for two violins and GDG(!) for string trio (both dedicated to Mimi Zweig and her Violin Virtuosi), Esther for Violin and Viola, Tikvah for Viola Solo, commissioned by the ARD for the 2008 Munich Viola Competition. Listen (Three Poems by W.S. Merwin) for Tenor, Clarinet, Viola, Cello, and Double Bass was commissioned by the International Musicians Seminar and performed in September 2010 on its concert tour, including London's Wigmore Hall, with tenor Mark Padmore. Cellist Gary Hoffman premiered Epitaph for Cello and String Orchestra in 2011 at the Kronberg Cello Festival and Arad gave the viola version of the piece at the 2012 International Viola Congress in Rochester, NY. In November 2018, Arad was a featured artist at the International Viola Congress in Rotterdam, premiering his new concerto for viola and strings, titled Ceci n'est pas un Bach.

In 2013, Arad Completed a set of Twelve Caprices, the first six of which he performed at the 2004 Viola Congress in Minnesota along with the rarely played Tibor Serly Viola Concerto. Later, in 2015-16, he toured extensively with the set as a whole in Tel Aviv, Boston, Chicago, Toronto, Berlin, Frankfurt, Detmold, Hamburg, Paris, Madrid, Porto, London, Manchester, Birmingham, Atlanta, Los Angeles, and Munich. The Twelve Caprices along with his Tikvah are now published by Hofmeister Musikverlag, Leipzig, and can be heard on iTunes and CD Baby.

Atar Arad is a recipient of the American Viola Society's Career Achievement Award (June 2018) and the International Viola Society's Silver Alto Clef 2018 "in recognition for his outstanding contributions to the to the viola" (November 2018). In 2021, the International Hindemith Viola Competition invited Arad to be one of its judges and commissioned the competition's mandatory piece from him. All participants publicly premiered his Chaconne for solo viola in October that year, in Munich. Atar Arad plays on a viola by Niccolo Amati (the 'Arad') and uses a set of PI strings, made by Thomastik.



Cathy Basrak

United States

A native of the Chicago area, Cathy Basrak earned her bachelor's degree from the Curtis Institute of Music in spring 2000. Her teachers include Joseph de Pasquale, principal viola of the BSO from 1947 to 1964, and Michael Tree of the Guarneri String Quartet. She has participated in the Marlboro Music Festival, Banff Centre for the Arts, and Norfolk Chamber Music Festival. In addition, she has performed with the Brandenburg Ensemble and Boston's Metamorphosen Ensemble and appeared as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, Chicago, Detroit, and Bavarian

Radio symphony orchestras, and Boston Pops with John Williams. Basrak has won several awards, including Grand Prize in the Seventeen Magazine/General Motors National Concerto Competition, First Prize in the William E. Primrose Memorial Scholarship Competition, First Prize in the Irving M. Klein International String Competition, and Second Prize in the 46th International Music Competition of the ARD in Munich. Basrak teaches at the Boston Conservatory and Boston University and also coaches chamber ensembles at New England Conservatory.





Ensik ChoiSouth Korea

Korean-born violist Ensik Choi's extraordinary talent was recognized by maestro Myung-Whun Chung at an early age. He was accepted to study on a full scholarship at Crossroads High School for Arts and Sciences in Santa Monica, California, studying with Heiichiro Ohyama, principal violist of the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Curtis Institute of Music, where he studied with Joseph de Pasquale, principal violist of the Philadelphia Orchestra.

While a student at Curtis, he formed the Borromeo String

Quartet, of which he was a member for five years. They won second prize at the Evian International Chamber Music Competition in France (1990) and the 1991 Young Artists International Auditions in New York. Mr. Choi's numerous concerts have included performances in the United States, Europe and Asia, including the 92nd street Y and Alice Tully Hall in New York, Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., Suntory Hall in Tokyo, and Wigmore Hall in London.

Choi has performed at many festivals, including Spoleto Festivals in both Charleston, South Carolina and Italy; Orlando Festival in the Netherlands; Vancouver Festival in Canada; Cape and Islands Festival in Massachusetts; Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival in New Mexico; Beijing International Music Festival in China; Seoul Spring chamber music; and Just Vivace Festival in Korea.

For three years, Choi was a faculty member at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston where he earned his Artist Diploma with distinguished violist Walter Trampler. He later served on the faculty at the college-conservatory at the University of Cincinnati. He is currently professor of Viola at College of Music, Seoul National University, and the artistic director for the Just Vivace Festival in Korea.



Steven Dann

Canada

Steven Dann was born on Canada's West Coast in Burnaby, B.C. His foremost teacher and mentor was the late Lorand Fenyves. Other significant influences along the way included William Primrose, Robert Pikler, and Bruno Giuranna.

Upon graduation from university, he was named Principal Viola of the National Arts Centre Orchestra in Ottawa, a position he subsequently held with the Tonhalle Orchestra in Zurich, the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra in

Amsterdam, the Vancouver Symphony, and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. He has served as guest principal of the Lucerne Festival Orchestra under Horst Stein and Rafael Fruhbeck de Burgos, the Boston Symphony Orchestra under Seiji Ozawa, the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra under Sir Simon Rattle and, in both performance and recordings, the Chamber Orchestra of Europe under Nikolaus Harnoncourt, Paavo Berglund, Ivan Fischer, and Pierre Boulez. He also led the viola section of the Canadian Opera Company for the opening of Toronto's Four Seasons opera house in performances of Wagner's Ring Cycle under Richard Bradshaw.

Steven Dann has collaborated as a soloist with such Maestri as Sir Andrew Davis, Rudolph Barshai, Jiri Belohlavek, Sir John Eliot Gardiner, Jukka-Pekka Saraste, Vladimir Ashkenazy, and Oliver Knussen.

Since 1990, Dann has been a member of the Smithsonian Chamber Players in Washington D.C. and was a founding member of the Axelrod String Quartet. He is also



violist of both the wonderfully eclectic Zebra Trio (with violinist Ernst Kovacic and cellist Anssi Karttunen) and Toronto's multi-Grammy-nominated ARC Ensemble. In solo and chamber music, Dann has recorded for Sony, Naxos, CBC Records, Marquis Classics, Centrediscs, RCA Red Seal, Ondine, Kairos, Chandos, ATMA Classique, and Toccata Classics. The Stereo Record Review described his recording of the viola works of Brahms (ATMA Classique) as "without doubt, one of the most beautiful viola recordings I have ever heard".

Dann has a diverse solo and chamber music repertoire born of both the researcher's joy in uncovering forgotten treasures, and a love of taking part in new creations. To name a few, important solo works with large ensembles by Mark-Anthony Turnage, Christos Hatzis, Morton Feldman, Giya Kancheli, Alexina Louie, and Jonathan Harvey. Unearthed gems from the past, some recorded for the first time, by Rebecca Clarke, Julius Röntgen, Jerzy Fitelberg, Pierre de Breville, Pierre Tournemire, Paul Ben-Haim, and Alberto Hemsi. And commissions including works from Peter Lieberson, R. Murray Schafer, Kaija Saariaho, Alexina Louie, Magnus Lindberg, Friedrich Cerha, and Hans Abrahamsen.

As both a performer and teacher, Dann is a regular guest at many international festivals and arts schools. He teaches viola and chamber music at the Glenn Gould School in Toronto's Royal Conservatory of Music and is the coordinator of chamber music programs at the Domaine Forget in Québec and the Music by the Sea Festival in British Columbia. With his colleagues in the Zebra Trio, a contemporary music seminar entitled "Creative Dialogue France" involving young and established composers and performers happens each August in the Loire Valley, France. Dann plays a viola commissioned from Joseph Curtin, based on the "Primrose" Guarneri.



Geraldine Walther

United States

Former violist of the Takács String Quartet and former Principal Violist of the San Francisco Symphony, Geraldine Walther previously served as assistant principal of the Pittsburgh Symphony, the Miami Philharmonic, and the Baltimore Symphony. During her tenure with the San Francisco Symphony, she was soloist with the orchestra 47 times and gave the US premiers of several important works. In 1995, Walther was selected by Sir Georg Solti as a member of his Musicians of the World, an orchestra composed of leading musicians from around the globe, for concerts in Geneva to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the United Nations. She has also served as principal violist with the Mainly Mozart Festival in San Diego and has performed as soloist with other orchestras.

As a member of the Takács Quartet, she traveled the world as a performer and served as Artist in Residence at the University of Colorado, Boulder. Walther's recordings include eighteen Hyperion recordings as a member of the Takacs Quartet, Hindemith's Trauermusik and Der Schwanendreher with the San Francisco Symphony (both on London/Decca), Paul Chihara's Golden Slumbers with the San Francisco Chamber Singers (Albany), and Lou Harrison's Threnody (New Albion), Delectable Pieces with the Volkert Trio (Con Brio), and numerous recordings available from Music@Menlo LIVE. With collaborator David Korevaar (piano), she has recorded two albums of viola sonatas, one featuring Brahms and the other works of Hindemith on the MSR label.

Walther is a founding artist of the Ruby Mountain Chamber Music Festival and the Chamber Music Sundaes series in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Bak currently serves as Assistant Professor of Viola at University of North Carolina School of the Arts (UNCSA).



Nancy Buck

Violist Nancy Buck has developed an international profile as a remarkable artist-teacher. Now a regular substitute at the Berliner Philharmoniker, Ms. Shin draws inspiration from artists such as Ms. Zimmermann, Ms. Imai, Lars Anders Tomter, Yura Lee, among others.



Otoha Tabata made her solo debut in London at age 11 and has since been performing as a soloist across Europe and worldwide. At age 10, she entered the Yehudi Menuhin School, growing up both in Japan and the U.K. Her studies were supported by scholarship and the Music and Dance Scheme. Currently, Ms. Tabata studies privately with Nobuko Imai and Jonathan Barritt at the Royal College of Music London, where she receives a full scholarship as a Richard Goulding Scholar supported by the Richard & Susan Jarvis Award. She has been selected as a scholar of the Rohm Music Foundation Japan 2023.

Recent awards include third prize at the Windsor Festival International String Competition, Promotion Prize at the Anton Rubinstein Viola Competition, and an honorary mention at the Oskar Nedbal Viola Competition. Since 2023, Ms. Tabata has been an Akademist of the Munich Philharmonic Orchestra and scholarship holder of Villa Musica Chamber Music Academy. Ms. Otoha performs on a Charles Boullangier viola, kindly loaned by the Royal College of Music.





Guohan Tang began learning the violin at the age of four. In 2012, he was admitted to the middle school of the Xinghai Conservatory of Music, where he switched to studying the viola under Donglei Hou. Since 2018, he has been studying at the University of the Arts, Berlin with Hartmut Rohde. Currently, he is pursuing a master's degree in Instrumental Soloist under Mr. Rohde at UDK Berlin.



Duleen van Gunsteren was born in 1995 in Noordwijk, Netherlands. He began his studies on the violin in the School for Young Talent in The Hague with Koosje van Haeringen. He continued his studies at the Conservatory of Rotterdam with Ron Ephrat and at the Conservatory of Amsterdam with Marjolein Dispa and Nobuko Imai. Mr. van Gunsteren won third prize in the International Oskar Nedbal Competition in 2023 as well as in the Triomphe de l'Arc Competition in 2024. He won special prizes in the Chamber Music Competition Gelre with Duo Van

Gunsteren Keinänen in 2023 (the Grachtenfestival Prize) and the Amsterdam National Viola Competition in 2021 (the Leo Smit Prize). He has followed master classes with Isabelle van Keulen, Garth Knox, Pierre Henri Xuereb, Atte Kilpeläinen, Lilli Maijala, and Anita Mitterer, among others. Polish violist **Kinga Wojdalska** is an upcoming soloist and chamber musician known for her emotional performances. Prior to this position, she was on the piano faculty at the Idyllwild Arts Academy. Dr. Fan has collaborated in recitals with renowned artists such as Andrew Bain, Roland Glassl, Paul Coletti, Roland Leonard, Arnold Steinhardt, Wen-Sinn Yang, etc. Vivian performed at Disney Hall in Los Angeles Philharmonic's



with her husband and their two young sons.




Gregory K. Williams




Grand Building, Main (Plaza) Level
